f. Physical Education (One Unit)

A twelfth grade student may be excused from the PE requirement by the principal of the school in which the student is enrolled under one of the following circumstances:

1. The student is enrolled in a cooperative or work study, or any other educational program authorized by the school which requires the student's absence from the school premises during the school day.
2. The student is enrolled in academic courses not otherwise available.
3. The student is involved in an organized and supervised athletic program which requires at least as much time of participation per week as 1/8 unit of physical education (25 minutes).

Students in grades nine through eleven may be excused from the physical education requirement in order to enroll in academic courses not otherwise available to the student due to the PE requirement. The student may be excused by the principal of the school in which the student is enrolled in consultation with the student's counselor for up to one semester per year if the parent or guardian of the student requests in writing that the student be excused from the physical education requirement. At some time, the requesting student must be involved in an organized and supervised athletic program which requires at least as much time of participation as 1/8 of PE per week (25 minutes). The student's parent or guardian must make this request in writing..

Physical Education

1 semester

Grade 9-12

Required

Credit: 1

Every student is required to enroll in physical education for one semester per year unless he or she presents a written excuse from a doctor. Student's limitations and disabilities will be considered individually. If necessary, an adaptive program will be set up to meet those needs.

Parenting is an introductory course in childcare and child development. The course will focus upon three areas of parenting: caring for children, nurturing children, and guiding children. Students will be given an opportunity to use the Baby-Think-It-Over (child care simulator).

Early Childhood Development

Semester

Grades 10-12

Elective

Credit: 1

This course will help prepare students for a career in childcare or early childhood education. Students will develop a portfolio of activities for the toddler and preschool child. Opportunities will be given for student to plan activities for children in the preschool and primary classes.

Food & Nutrition

Semester

Grade: 9-12

Elective

Credit: 1

In this course, students will explore basic nutritional guidelines in relation to wellness across a lifespan. Particular emphasis will be placed on nutritional value of foods and accurately reading food labels. Students will learn how to manage and use foods to meet nutritional needs. Basic entry technique labs will be included. They will also explore safety and sanitation procedures using ServSafe, a food safety program from the National Restaurant Association. This course is a prerequisite for entry into ProStart I.

ProStart I

All Year

Grade: 10-11

Elective

Credit: 2

Prerequisite: Successful completion of Food Choices

ProStart I is the first in a 2-course program created by the National Restaurant Association Educational Foundation. In this course, students learn the management and culinary skills needed for a career in the foodservice industry. Within the course, students will learn aspects of

safety and sanitation, communication, management, and customer service as well as basic culinary skills. Lab experiences will include soups, sauces, fruits, vegetables, and grains. This course is a prerequisite for ProStart II, which will be offered next year. **Maximum class size 15.**

Senior Culinary

Semester

Grade: 12

Elective

Credit: 1

Prerequisite: Successful completion of Food Choices

This course is offered for seniors only as all other students will have the opportunity to complete the ProStart program. This course will focus on techniques used in the food industry. Students will learn basic culinary skills including knife and garnishing skills, advanced baking skills, sandwiches, soups, and sauces. Students will design their own restaurant including menu. **Maximum class size 15.**

Physical Education

Semester

Grade 9-12

Required

Credit: 1

Every student is required to enroll in physical education every semester per year unless he or she presents a written excuse from a doctor. Student's limitations and disabilities will be considered individually. If necessary, an adaptive program will be set up to meet those needs.

Athletic Strength & Conditioning

Semester

Grade 9-12

Elective and can fulfill PE requirement

Credit: 1

Prerequisites: Instructor Approval

Throughout this course, students will follow the guidelines in place for the Red Oak Community School District Strength & Conditioning program, focusing on long term athletic development and life-long fitness components. Students will follow a strategically designed program that emphasizes proper movement patterns, running/sprinting mechanics, ability to change direction and progresses the students based on the student's specific needs. Students enrolled in this course will be involved in a program that is designed to focus on the progress of the student over their four-year high school career.

Health I

Fall semester

Grade 9 -12

Elective

Credit: 1

This semester course will provide students with knowledge, skills and resources to help a healthy lifestyle. Topics covered will include health skills for the healthy consumer, physical activity, nutrition, personal care of the body and body systems, injury prevention and environmental health.

Health II

Spring semester

Grade 9 -12

Elective

Credit: 1

This elective semester course focuses on the health issues facing today's adolescent. Areas of study include mental health, promoting safe and healthy relationships, human growth and development, and disease prevention including STI's and HIV/AIDS.

Alan and Tess have done a phenomenal job of working together and determining the best way to add course options for students. With the addition of Tess and the combining of grades into one building, we will be able to greatly expand the program. As you probably know, CASE requires teachers to attend intensive workshops over the curriculum before it can be used in their classrooms. Alan is certified to teach courses to students, but also facilitates learning for other instructors. He shared a notebook from the biotech course he took over the summer and it is intense. Expanding this program doesn't just increase opportunities for our students, but it greatly increases rigorous offerings. I also want to point out that these courses will not be offered for science credit. Students will receive all science credit through required courses. Ag courses will remain listed under ag so as not to interfere with a student's ability to participate in FFA.

We met several times this fall to determine the progression of courses for this program and the best way to phase in ProStart. You will see me back each year as Patty attends more training and we are able to add more courses. We are beginning this year by removing courses that, without significant other coursework, would not lead our students to a career. Thus you see the deletion of interior design, clothing, 21st century living, and a complete rework of the foods courses. However, in order to have a complete program in FCS, we need 3 full consecutive units of study that would build upon each other or 3 comprehensive units that encompass FCS topics. FACS for You gives students an introduction to clothing and design as well as other traditional family and consumer science topics. We will leave that in place so that students can still gain exposure to those elements. In addition, we are keeping the parenting and early childhood courses. Several students take these courses each year. They are quite practical and can lead to various careers.

The foods courses are being redone in order to build our ProStart program. As a precursor to taking ProStart, we want students to gain a solid understanding of nutrition as well as health and sanitation procedures. This will happen in the Food & Nutrition course. Iowa now has a requirement that every food establishment have a "certified food protection manager on staff." This requirement can be met by having a staff member with ServSafe certification. Patty has passed the ServSafe training and is now working towards certification to be a proctor. Our goal is that as juniors or seniors, students will have been exposed to the instruction several times and will have the opportunity to become ServSafe certified.

Patty will be taking ProStart course I this summer. We will be able to offer the course in the fall. This is a full year course that includes safety and sanitation, communication, management, and customer service as well as basic culinary skills. Due to the nature of the course and safety concerns, we would like to cap each class at 15 students. Patty has attended a ProStart conference and talked with educators across the state to help prepare and get a feel for what works and doesn't. She and I also visited schools earlier this month in order to get an idea of how space was set up, how students worked in the space, and find out what instructors suggested. All instructors said they have no more than 4 students per workstation, 2 schools said they prefer 2 but cap it at 3 students. They all cited safety as the main reason, but also pointed out that students are not able to gain experience that is true to the industry if there are "too many cooks in the kitchen." Given the space that we will have available, Patty and I feel that 15 is the maximum that can safely and reasonably take the course.

We were concerned that seniors who have taken foods courses would not have an opportunity to take any their senior year as ProStart would not be offered to them. For this reason, we wanted to offer Senior Culinary. This course would offer any seniors who have taken a foods course during high school to take a semester course that would give them a glimpse of techniques used in the food industry including knife and garnishing skills, advanced baking skills, sandwiches, soups, and sauces. Again, due to space and safety concerns, we would like to cap this course at 15 students.

We will be decreasing offerings in PE, but building a strength and conditioning program. Nick Crouse has been working on developing this program more extensively this year and his curriculum work has surrounded this. We will also remove Aerobic/Fitness from the course listings. We don't feel the course is serving its intended purpose. With an increased emphasis on strength and conditioning for our athletes, the general PE course will be best suited for the remainder of students and will encompass all necessary standards.

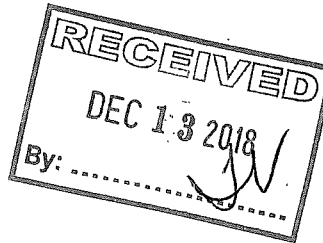
